Erin Johnson Abbott, 1998 – Athletics

John Klimas, 1965 – Medicine

Dr. John Klimas is a highly acclaimed allergist in Charlotte NC. He was selected by local physicians as a top doctor in his specialty and recently named by Consumer Reports as one of the best allergists in Charlotte. He currently is an associate professor at UNC Medical School and past president of Mecklenburg County Medical Society. Dr. Klimas founded the Physicians Reach Out program that provides medical services for citizens of Mecklenburg County who do not have insurance. Dr. Klimas has won numerous awards: 2003 Man of the Year in Science and Medicine, Vectors/Pittsburgh; Doctors in America Best '92,'94,'96, '02-'04; Elisa Klein Lectureship, University of MA School. of Medicine. .John graduated from Rutgers in '69 with Phi Beta Kappa honors and earned a medical degree from SUNY Buffalo in 1973. John is active in local church and community groups

James D. Marchio, 1974 – Military and Government Service

Jim has spent the last 28 years serving in critical roles in various national security agencies and in the defense of our country. He is currently a Senior Intelligence Evaluator in the Office of the Director of National Intelligence's Office of Analytic Integrity and Standards. Prior to this position, Jim served for 26 years in the U.S. Air

Force, retiring in 2006 as a Colonel. While in the Air Force, Jim specialized in Military Intelligence, and ultimately was the Deputy Director of the Air Force Intelligence Analysis Agency and Chief of DIA's Russia/Eurasia and Africa Office. Jim also worked with the NATO Command on Intelligence during the Bosnia situations. He still pursues his avocation of weight lifting, and has won four national titles, a world power lifting championship, six world power lifting records in his age and weight class. Jim and his family live in Manassas, VA.

Frank Cognetti – Long time Music and Choir teacher

Frank Cognetti was supervisor of Fine, Practical and Performing Arts of the N. P. Public School District, teaching music and choir since 1964. He was founder of the N.P. District Arts Festival, and was active in Symphony and opera groups in the region. When Frank lifted his hand to direct the North Plainfield High School Chorus for his last time in 2004, the stage was suddenly packed by scores of Cognetti's former students. They were there to express their thanks and admiration to their much beloved teacher for his 34 years of commitment to music students at North Plainfield High School.

Teaching stints in Binghamton, New York and Elizabeth, New Jersey, preceded Cognetti's teaching career at North Plainfield which begin in 1970. Over the course of his career, Cognetti directed every aspect of choral music in grades seven to twelve. During that time, many of Cognetti's students were awarded places in state and regional choruses. He also managed the New Jersey All State Chorus in 1990.

Teacher of the Year honors went to Cognetti in 1994, the first year of the district's participation in the Governor's Teacher Recognition Program.

Cognetti holds a B.S. in Music from Wilkes College, and a Masters in Music from Kean University. He has also studied at the College of New Jersey, Syracuse University and the University of Scranton. He and his wife Lynn have two children, Cara and Christopher and three grandchildren.

Remembering Camille: A Brother's Tribute

Camille Caruso was born Saturday, Aug. 21,1920 at 22 Warren St. In North Plainfield, where the family lived in difficult times because it was the start of the Depression years. Many families had to go without the necessities to live a decent life. We lived on the second floor and Camille was the third of seven children, two girls and five boys, with Mom and Pop it made nine all together. It was a happy family, as everyone had to work at an early age.

She was born in a small room, as we never were familiar with the hospitals and had no way of traveling, because we had no car.

Heat was provided by a furnace using wood and coal for fuel. When it got a little chilly we had to shovel the coal into the furnace to keep it going. At night, once the coal was used up there would be no heat and it was always cold in the morning.

We had no refrigerator. At that time it was called an "ice box," which had to be supplied with ice. Luckily, an ice house was located across the street. We would purchase a block of ice for about 15 cents and carry it upstairs to keep the ice box cold. When the ice melted after a few days, we would have to buy another piece of ice. Camille would always be part of the ice carriers.

In the winter time, some of the food was placed in a small metal storage bin that was located outside the bathroom window. It did not hold much food, but it saved us buying ice.

The bathroom situation had its problems, especially in the morning, when all the family was up. There was no hot water in the morning, as the water heater had to be ignited. It was not an automatic water heater. If you like to wash in cold water, it

was great. The children were told to wash before going to school. We washed, but only with a very few sprinkles of water. Papa, who had poor eyesight, would inspect us. He would feel your face to make sure it was wet. If it didn't feel right you would have to go back and wash again.

Camille started school at age 5, walking to Somerset School, which was five blocks away. It was at kindergarten where she met her friend Mary Rossi. They both transferred to St. Joseph's School in North Plainfield after it was completed in 1930. The tuition to attend the school was 10 cents a week — A modest cost in those days. The #3.75 a year was rarely paid. After graduation Camille attended North Plainfield High School for about two years and had to leave school to attend beauty culture school so she could work as a hairdresser.

About age 12, Camille and I were in town on Halloween night while a parade was in progress. People were all dressed in costumes and some were riding on a flatbed truck. We thought it would be fun to jump on the truck while it was moving and go for a little ride, as we very rarely were able to enjoy a ride. We did not know where we were going. We ended up two miles from home when we decided to jump off the truck and walk back home. We enjoyed the ride and the excitement. When we arrived home. Mom wanted to know where we were until 10 p.m. "Just watching a parade," exclaimed Camille. While we had very little means of entertainment, we would have to make up games to have some fun. We played hopscotch, tag, rolled up a few stockings to play catch and mounted a peach basket on the telephone pole so we could play basketball. Camille excelled in all these games, she was much faster than many of the boys. The radio and phonograph were always a favorite means of entertainment. Sunday night proved to be the best for listening. The whole family would sit by the radio and listen to Eddie Cantor, Jack Benny and Joe Penner, whose favorite slogan was "Wanna buy a Duck." Weekdays scheduled Little Orphan Annie, Lowell Thomas and Amos and Andy.

Camille would always help her mother with many of the chores around the house like cleaning, washing clothes, cooking and running errands. When it was supper time, whoever sat at the table first ate good. The rest of the family had to eat the leftovers.

One day, Camille, who was about 11 years old, had to bring the daily lunch to Papa at his pool room. I was walking with her. Before we arrived, Camille said to me, "I see something shiny on the ledge of the store window of the barber shop across the street, go across the street and feel the ledge."

Rosanne the Riveter

Rosanne De Andrea Cucurello, a 1939 graduate of North Plainfield High School was honored recently by the South Plainfield Borough Council for her service during World War II. Rosanne joined six million other women in answering the war time call to transform themselves into substitute factory workers during World War II, leading to the birth of the legendary heroine, "Rosie The Riveter."

Rosie became the most famous poster-girl for War Bonds. The "We Can Do It" poster depicts a woman flexing her muscle like Cucurello who joined the domestic war effort at the General Motors plant in Linden where hundreds of women produced fighter planes known as Wildcats. The women employed at the plant worked in three shifts and each shift was responsible for producing a plane a week.

The 86-year old Cucurello, who serves as Recording Secretary for the Suburban Women's Club of South Plainfield, was singled out by friends in the local chapter when the General Federation of Women's Clubs asked its member groups to recognize "Rosies" in their communities. Rosanne is currently a member of the American Rosie The Riveter Association.

NPHS Grad, Pegged "The Father of March Madness"

For three weeks every Spring there is a time period where the whole country concentrates its focus on one sport, basketball. It's called, "March Madness." No other sport generates such interest for this amount of time. It has everything: Mystery, excitement, comebacks, upsets and the little guy.

The history of March Madness goes back to the early 80's when Tom Odjakjian joined ESPN in its infancy. A graduate of North Plainfield High School in 1972 and Lafayette in 1976, Odjakjian's passion for his former schools was the inspiration for his vision to give the Valparaisos and the George Masons of the world a proper showcase right next to Duke, UCLA, Indiana and Kansas. Fond memories formed the foundation for his belief for the little guys on the big stage.

"I also had a big spot in my heart for the underdogs because I came from that background. That's why I pitched the little guys. I knew there was room for both.," said Odjakjian.

Tom's dedication and vision helped champion the small-school cause when he joined the Programming Department of ESPN which began in 1979 in its embryonic stages. With ESPN hungry for any type of programming, Odjakjian was given the green light to round up the rights to



televise small school championship games. In 1980 ESPN signed on for the first-round games of the NCAA Tournament. Those

Thursday noon games that the major networks wanted no part of, and when those telecasts succeeded by 1990 CBS, which had the rights to later-round NCAA games, swooped in to buy the total package.

While Director of College Sports for ESPN in the early days the progression began and he became the ultimate salesman. He convinced his superiors there was an audience willing to watch obscure colleges play basketball at all hours of the day or night.

While she waited, I walked across the street and I felt the ledge. There were four or five coins, about 50 cents, waiting to be scooped up. Was this a miracle? She never explained how they got there.



After a short engagement they were married on Oct. 2, 1942 at St. Joseph Church in North Plainfield. Father Thomas Campbell performed the ceremony. There were no pictures allowed during the ceremony. Sam Rayder, who married my sister Mary, said "Give me the camera, I will take a picture near the back of the church." "Father Campbell motioned for Sam to leave the Church immediately.

Her loving Husband, Dan Corona, died in 2004 and Camille died in 2008.

She is sadly missed by all her wonderful friends and family.

Camille was a very special person in my life. I enjoyed her company immensely and I will never forget her. We were very close even until the end.
